Dear Friends,

Welcome to the annual fall newsletter of the Archives of the History of American Psychology. This is our opportunity to keep you informed of our activities and accomplishments. As always, your generous support has allowed us to accomplish many things in service to the historical record of psychology. I hope you will take a minute to continue that support by completing the enclosed pledge card.

It has been a busy year. I have been dividing my days between the archives and the main library. In May I was asked to serve as the interim dean of the University Libraries. This is a temporary 12 month appointment and we are actively engaged in a search for a new dean. My time spent has been well worth it. The AHAP is a branch of the university libraries and serving as dean has provided an opportunity to bring the archives into closer collaboration with a host of library services. I am not a candidate for the position and do not wish to be.

I am especially pleased to announce that Dianna Ford has joined us as a full time faculty member. This fall Dianna received an appointment as an assistant professor of cataloguing. She is now directing the cataloguing of our manuscript collections. Dianna has worked as a staff member at the AHAP for the past 6 years. We certainly are pleased with her new appointment. We are also pleased to welcome Megan Vance as our development officer. Megan began at the AHAP 3 years ago as a student assistant. Her passion for the history of psychology and her background in business are true assets. Megan is a terrific ambassador for the archives and is always available to talk with you about the ways in which you can support the archives.

Last year we committed ourselves to streamlining our arrangement and description of manuscript collections. You can see the results of this effort by visiting our website ([www.uakron.edu/ahap](http://www.uakron.edu/ahap)) and viewing some examples of our new cataloguing system. You will also see that our website continues to grow. An example is the mental health database that was compiled with the generous assistance of the Margaret Clark Morgan Foundation. The database allows for searching our processed holdings that include material related to the history of the mental health movement in America.

Our goal for this year is to increase our web presence. Many of you have indicated that our web site allows greater access to our holdings and you would like us to do more. We could not agree more. We are developing databases that will allow you to search our test collection, media holdings, collections waiting processing, and much more.

We remain deeply committed to our work and are eager to share the rich resources of the Archives of the History of American Psychology with all of you. ## AHAP Hosts Cheiron 2004

The AHAP was proud to host the 36th annual meeting of Cheiron (The International Society for the History of Behavioral and Social Sciences) for the third time, previously hosted in 1970 and 1979. The meeting was held at The University of Akron in the newly built, state of the art, Student Union building. David Baker served as local host and Dorothy Gruich coordinated the details of the conference.

More than 90 participants from around the world convened for four days of meetings and activities. This year's keynote speaker was Professor William E. Cross, Jr., Coordinator of the Social-Personality Doctoral Program, at the City University of New York (CUNY). Dr. Cross is considered one of the leading experts on the study of African-American identity, and his text, *Shades of Black: Diversity in African-American Identity* (Temple University Press, 1991), is considered a classic. His work has been extremely influential to scholars theorizing and researching Jewish Identity, Asian-American Identity, White ethnic-group identity, Latina and Latino identity, and Gay and Lesbian identity. Dr. Cross spoke on "*Black Identity, Before and After Brown*". A special panel discussing the legacy of the Brown vs. Board of Education was also on the program.

The program also featured a memorial for Dr. Josef Brozek (1913-2004) along with several posters highlighting his work. Dr. Brozek passed away in February and will be missed by all of us. His impact cross-culturally could be seen in the poster sessions that featured individuals from Prague, Madrid, Brazil, New Hampshire, including his daughter, Mary Mosher Flesher, from Smith College. Yoshka, as he was known to some, was a charter member of the Cheiron Society and president in 1972-73. He also served on the AHAP Board of Advisers.

The first Cheiron Book Prize was presented to Prof. Jeffrey Sklansky of the Department of History, Oregon State University for *The Soul's Economy: Market Society and Selfhood in American Society* (Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 2002). Prof. Sklansky accepted the award and gave a talk, he was also on hand for a book signing during the Cheiron reception.

Over 60 people attended an optional night out at Canal Park for a baseball game between The Akron Aeros, the minor league affiliate of the Cleveland Indians and 2003 Eastern League AA champions, and the Harrisburg Senators, the minor league team of the Montreal Expos. The ticket included price of admission, a souvenir mini baseball and \$8 in Stadium Bucks. Attendees were also treated to a wonderful display of fireworks at the end of the evening.

In addition to a well attended banquet that included a grand buffet and a feisty book auction, tours of the AHAP facility were also highlights of this year's conference. An overwhelming number of people signed up to take tours during lunch hours and were impressed by the archives facility and resources.

The program ended on a lively note after vigorous discussion on the topic of "Psychology Archives World-wide in the Twenty-first Century" featuring symposium guests David Baker of AHAP, Jacques Dane of the Archives of Dutch Psychology, University of Groningen and David K. Robinson of the Division of Social Science, Truman State University.

The 37th Annual Meeting of Cheiron will be hosted by Richard von Mayrhauser and the Office for the History of Science and Technology (OHST) at the University of California, Berkeley, on June 23-26, 2005. On a sad note, we were shocked to hear of the premature death in August of long-time Cheiron member, Dr. Nancy Innis (1941-2004). Nancy was a long-time supporter of the archives and a frequent visitor to the AHAP over the years in her quest to discover all there is about Edward C. Tolman. Her dedication to the field and her genuine personality will be greatly missed.

## Publicity

We are pleased that our efforts continue to be recognized by various outlets. We appreciate the coverage received from the APA Monitor regarding the opening of our exhibit at the National Inventors Hall of Fame. Additional exposure for the exhibit was generated from an interview with David Baker on local radio station WNIR "Talk of Akron".

Each year David chairs an invited history symposium at the annual meeting of the APS. Coverage of the 2004 symposium All Labs Great and Small appeared in the August edition of the *APS Observer*.

On May 4, 2004 David was quoted in a New York Times article on Albert Ellis.

David was also interviewed April 16, 2004 on KUOW FM, Seattle Public radio, following Lauren Slater, author of *Opening Skinner's Box: Great Psychological Experiments of the Twentieth Century*. The interview was also accessible through internet radio and is available at AHAP for interested listeners.

## Mental Health History Database

The Mental Health History Database provides a searchable subject-based index to AHAP manuscript collections that contain materials related to mental health. Searching is available by author and/or keyword. Please note that this index refers only to processed manuscript collections from the AHAP. ## AHAP Hosts EAD Workshop

On November 4 & 5, 2004 The Archives of the History of American Psychology (AHAP) co-sponsored a workshop on Encoded Archival Description (EAD) with the Society of American Archivists (SAA). The workshop was held in the Polsky Building on the University of Akron Campus - just two floors above AHAP. Twenty-five registrants, the maximum amount allowed, from around the state and country attended the two day workshop.

The subjects covered in the workshop included: encoding finding aids using Encoded Archival Description, providing an overview of Standard Generalized Markup Language (SGML) and Extensible Markup Language (XML), examining the structure of EAD (which is the standard for archival finding aids on the Web endorsed by SAA), and marking up finding aids using Xmetal software.

We were very excited to co-sponsor this workshop for two major reasons. First, AHAP is just beginning to work on implementing Encoded Archival Description (EAD) as a way of supplying fully searchable finding aids on the Web. Second, we were excited to give an opportunity for area institutions to partake in this workshop that may not otherwise have been able to afford to send people out of state to attend.

We are happy to say that the workshop was a resounding success, and we hope to co-sponsor more workshops in the future.

## Full Time Addition to AHAP

On September 15, 2004 I was hired as the Archival / Special Materials Cataloger for the Archives of the History of American Psychology (AHAP). In this position I will be responsible for cataloging the manuscript collections as well as the books, apparatus, film, and all other archival material.

Once cataloged, the archival materials will appear in the library's online public access catalog (OPAC) as well as in WorldCat and the Online Computer Library Center (OCLC) union catalog. The end result of this will be increased access due to a higher level of representation in the resources of which patrons make the most use.

In addition to cataloging, I have been enlisted to undertake the task of implementing a system for publishing our finding aids in a searchable format on the Web using the Encoded Archival Description standard. Again, the purpose of this work is to increase access to AHAP's collections. Having complete finding aids on the Web would greatly increase the ease of use for off-site researchers.

This is incredibly exciting and important work which I am grateful that I have been given the opportunity to undertake. I hope that you will share my excitement as you see the changes taking place!

## APA Sponsors Teaching Workshop at the National Inventors Hall of Fame

The APA Education Directorate and the Teachers of Psychology in Secondary Schools (TOPSS) sponsored a one-day workshop for teachers of psychology held in conjunction with the Psychology Exhibition now on display at the National Inventors Hall of Fame in Akron, Ohio. The workshop, "Integrating the Psychology Exhibition into the Classroom," was held Friday, October 8, 2004. Presenters included renowned historian of psychology, Ludy T. Benjamin, Jr. of Texas A&M University, College Station, TX and respected teacher, Charlie Blair-Broeker, Cedar Falls High School, Cedar Falls, IA.

The workshop provided participants with information on how to import the ideas and demonstrations of the museum exhibits into their own classroom and encouraged teachers to bring their psychology classes to the Hall of Fame to participate in the active learning afforded by this extraordinary exhibition. The workshop was open to all teachers of introductory psychology, particularly those who teach at the high school levels. The \$40 registration fees included breakfast, lunch, relevant handouts and materials, and admission into the Hall of Fame. Materials given to attendees included the most recent edition of APA's Activities Handbook, which provided numerous activities that can be incorporated into the classroom. The workshop was followed by an optional one-hour tour of the Psychology Archives, provided by Dr. David Baker. More than half of the attendees stayed to visit the archives and gain additional knowledge.

## Archives Open House

The Psychology Archives, in conjunction with the University of Akron Archives, hosted an Open House on Friday, October 22nd. All University of Akron faculty, staff and students were invited to venture into the basement of the Polsky Building and discover the hidden treasures of both archives and meet the friendly and helpful staff.

It was a great opportunity for everyone to learn more about what each archives has to offer and how the rich resources can benefit each and every individual on campus. Interesting display items were exhibited and tours through the archives were also readily available. Over 100 people were estimated to have stopped by to check out the unique artifacts and enjoyed snacks and refreshments during the 3 hour event. People were also encouraged to participate in a raffle to win books, note cards and digital prints of interesting archival images. Due to its success, there is discussion of hosting an Open House on an annual basis.

## Friends Report

For the fiscal year October 1, 2003 to September 30, 2004, gifts totaling more than \$31,450.00 were received in the 12-month period. Gifts ranged from \$10.00 to \$5,000.00. This amount included a spring mailing as well as the usual fall mailing. All of the money came from the generosity of new memberships, renewals and miscellaneous donations and continues to be used for the sole purpose of collection processing and maintenance. As an affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution, we continue to be able to offer free Smithsonian membership for donors that contribute \$100 or more to the Friends.

We also continue to offer student membership at the special reduced rate of \$10.00. The student membership fee also includes the annual newsletter and poster.

## Hall of Fame Exhibit Opens With Record Crowd

The exhibit entitled "Psychology: It's More Than You Think!", a first-time collaborative effort between the AHAP and the National Inventors Hall of Fame, opened to the public on January 16, 2004 to the largest crowd in the museum's history. The exhibit has already been extended twice, originally scheduled to be on display through August 31, 2004, the success of the exhibit prompted decision-makers to extend the exhibit through January 2005.

Many visitors, researchers, and tour groups have taken advantage of the proximity of the museum to the archives (it is only 1 block from the Polsky Building) and visited the exhibit while making a trip to the archives. The exhibit features artifacts from late 19th century psychology laboratories, including the Hipp chronoscope, as well as early tools for measuring visual and auditory perception and memory. The displays include archival video footage showing their use in research studies. One of the favorites by visitors is the Ames room, a trapezoidal room that creates a visual distortion so that two items of the same size appear dramatically different in size.

The exhibit also allows visitors to experience, touch and examine psychology in action through a variety of experiments and activities. The interactive exhibit highlights the human brain and behavior, social interactions, child development and emotions as well as the inventions of psychology. This interactive part of the exhibit was donated by the APA in 2003 after being retired as the Traveling Psychology Exhibit.

## Kantor Fellowship

Fellows are expected to utilize the resources of the Archives of the History of American Psychology in support of a program of research and scholarship in the history of psychology. Preference will be given to applicants who have received the doctoral degree within the last five years. The award is intended to assist with travel and living expenses, up to \$1,000.00, while pursuing these primary sources. (If no award is considered to merit funding in any one year, the stipend could be added to the next offering.)

This Fellowship honors the memory of Jacob Robert Kantor (1888-1984) and his interest in the history of psychology. Over the course of a long and productive career at Indiana University, Professor Kantor sought to organize scientific values into a coherent framework by replacing mentalistic concepts with those derived from naturalistic observations. These priorities suggest that proposals might deal with the history of various versions of behaviorism, as well as with subjects such as instinct, intelligence, language, or memory; but proposals are welcome on any topic relating to the evolution of scientific psychology.

Applicants should provide five copies of the completed application form. Applications are available online at [www.uakron.edu/ahap](http://www.uakron.edu/ahap) or by contacting the AHAP. The Committee will employ blind review. The deadline for receipt of proposals is April 30, 2005. Selection of the recipient will be announced by July 1, 2005. Funds must be used by June 30, 2006.

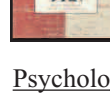

## AHAP Hosts VA Psychology Colloquium -

In October we welcomed Dr. Rodney R. Baker of the VA to our fall colloquium series. Although Dr. Baker is retired from the VA after 39 years of service he is now enjoying a second career involving the history of psychology within the VA. As you may have read in our previous newsletter we acquired the VA Psychology History Archives in 2003 so we were very happy to have Dr. Baker here in Akron. The title of his presentation was *Contributions of VA Psychology to American Psychology*.

According to Dr. Baker, an increase in sensitivity towards mental health problems and a certain legitimizing of psychology took place after WWII. This was due largely to the 16 million returning veterans, many of whom were in need of mental health care. The passage of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (a.k.a. The G.I. Bill of Rights) in 1944 authorized occupational, educational, and health assistance for veterans but the VA lacked the staff and resources to back the bill. This realization sparked the idea of training programs within the VA to help supply their demand for health care professionals.

In January of 1946 VA policy Memorandum Number 2 was published and the ball began to roll. This established affiliations between veterans hospitals and medical schools; many of which are still in effect today. Although 60% of patients in VA hospitals at this time were being treated for neuropsychiatric problems, psychologists were not included in these initial affiliations.

The year 1946 also marked the establishment of the VA psychology training program which was championed by James G. Miller, the first Chief Clinical Psychologist of the VA's new Clinical Psychology Section. On a side note, Henry A. Murray was first offered the job and although he did not accept, he described it in a letter to a friend as "an opportunity to influence the course of psychological developments for a generation." Portions of this letter are housed in the VA Psychology History Archives.

James Miller's first job was to recruit 500 clinical psychologists for work in the Clinical Psychology Section, however this was close to the entire number of doctoral clinical psychologists in the country working in a professional practice setting. Once again the VA would have to train their own. Dr. Miller was able to find a loop-hole within Memorandum Number 2 to include psychologists and was able to persuade the administration of the VA to establish a VA clinical psychology training program. There were 225 funded training positions for psychology students in place by the fall of 1946.

Although things were beginning to fall into place, Dr. Miller was skeptical of the quality of training that graduate students were receiving in clinical psychology at certain universities. This skepticism prompted Miller to get the APA involved in identifying universities that provided adequate training in clinical psychology. The APA would go on to identify 22 universities for the first training session in 1946-1947. It is generally accepted that it was this initial search that led the APA to develop its accreditation programs.

Starting in 1991 the VA began funding post-doctoral internship training and has since funded over 300 post-doctoral psychology fellows. In fact, in the current training year the VA will be supporting 73 post-doctoral fellowships and 359 pre-doctoral internship training positions. In 60 years of psychological training the VA has funded at least 25,000 psychologists in clinical and counseling psychology. The VA remains the biggest employer of psychologists in the world with over 1400 doctoral psychologists at work today.

Although the impact of VA psychology on American psychology is immense, Dr. Baker informed us that the history of VA psychology and its contributions are not well documented. He attributes this to the fact that numerous internal publications were not readily available to the non-VA community and remain difficult to find. The VA Central Office Library in Washington D.C. holds various items but even they do not have copies of the psychology research newsletters prior to 1959, which are feared to be lost. Look for an APA published book in 2005 by Dr. Baker and Dr. Wade Pickren concerning these and other issues in the history of VA psychology.

## AHAP Facts

1. AHAP was founded by Dr. Popplestone and Dr. McPherson in 1965 to preserve the historical record of psychology.
2. AHAP is the only archives in the United States that collects, catalogs and preserves materials related to the field of psychology, and is the largest collection of its kind in the world.
3. The Psychology Archives moved from Simmons Hall to the Polsky Building in 1994.
4. Over 750 manuscript collections are housed in the archives.
5. The photo archives contains over 20,000 images of individuals, groups, research and laboratory settings and personal photos.
6. Over 6000 films, from research to home movies, are preserved at AHAP.
7. The Psychology Archives has been featured on the History Channel's "History's Lost and Found", in the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*, *Akron Beacon Journal* and various psychological publications.
8. AHAP is an affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution.
9. The Psychology Archives currently has exhibits on display at the National Inventors Hall of Fame, Ellis Island National Museum and the National Zoo in Washington D.C.
10. AHAP's collection of over 1000 objects and artifacts is among the largest in America.
11. The AHAP Test Center contains over 6000 three-dimensional and paper and pencil tests.
12. The AHAP Book Collection includes rare books, textbooks, professional and trade publications. Over 50,000 volumes have been acquired since its inception.
13. The archives website is [www.uakron.edu/ahap](http://www.uakron.edu/ahap).
14. Charitable gifts, in the form of archival materials and through gifts of cash, are always welcome.
15. The Friends of the Archives of the History of American Psychology development program supplements and enriches the archival mission.
16. The archives director, David Baker, will be featured in an upcoming documentary produced by Lucas Films.
17. Since 1999, the AHAP has produced two books and hosted three national conferences.
18. Over 300 people visit the archives annually and more than 100 people visit the AHAP website daily.
19. The archives is open to patrons 12 months a year.
20. Students can volunteer and earn course credits for working at the AHAP.

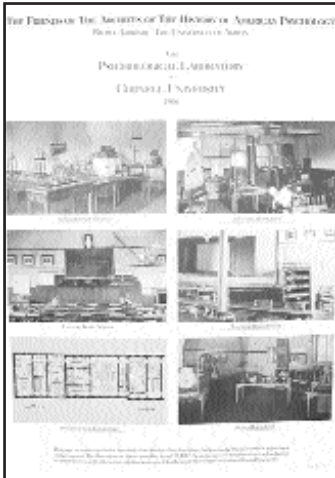

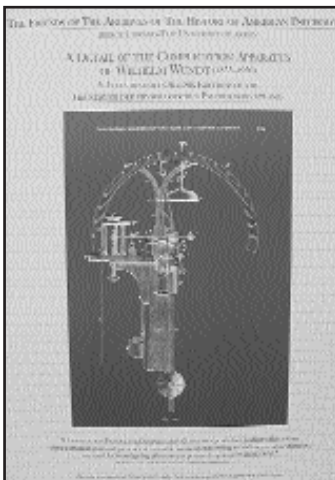

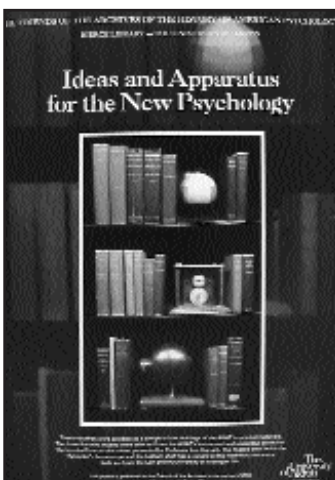

Wilhelm Wundt (1832-1920)



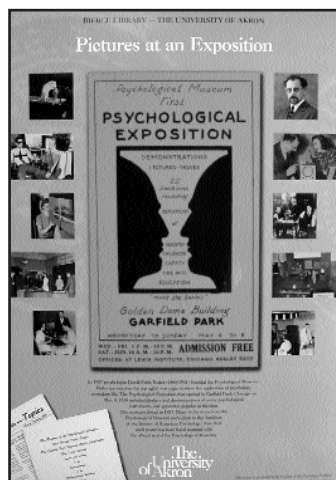

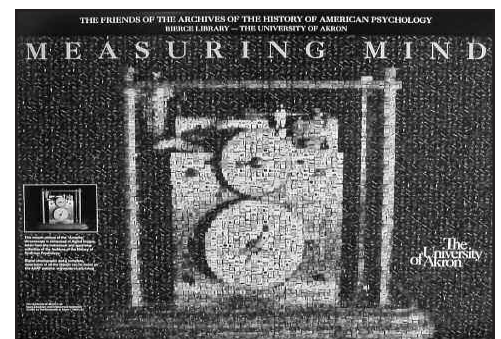
