The goal for this year is to increase the visibility of our instrument and apparatus collection. During the year we have inventoried, cleaned, reshelved, and photographed the collection. I have appointed an Instruments, Apparatus, and Exhibits Advisory Group to help guide us in the process of making our holdings more widely known and accessible. The addition of the APA's traveling exhibit provides a base from which we can expand and develop programs that inform the public about the science of psychology and its history. I am extremely pleased to announce that, after nearly a year's effort, we have been approved as an Affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution.

## Psychograph Gets New Home at AHAP

Now, among our many prized possessions, we have a PSYCOGRAPH. With only minor repairs to electrical cords, etc., we expect to have our "automated phrenology machine" in working order very soon. The machine arrived at AHAP fully assembled from Seattle—donated by Guenter Risse, M.D., Ph.D, Professor Emeritus of the History of Medicine, University of California, San Francisco.

We were informed of the existence of this rare piece of apparatus by a long-time friend of AHAP, Dr. Peter van Drunen of the Archives of Dutch Psychology. He had communicated with Dr. Risse requesting reprints of photos from Risse's 1976 *JHBS* article about phrenology. Risse mentioned to van Drunen that he had a working psychograph which was displayed in his home. The psychograph had been given to Risse in 1970 by the grandson of the man who had financed the invention. The machine had moved with Risse from Minneapolis to Madison, Wisconsin and later to San Francisco. When Dr. Risse retired from academia he moved the machine to his home in Seattle. We feel fortunate indeed to have been introduced to Dr. Risse who made it possible for us to provide a permanent home for this psychograph. With the apparatus we received photographs, copies of newspaper and magazine articles about the design and use of the machine, patent information, and copies of correspondence among proponents and opponents of phrenology.

The inventor was Henry C. Lavery (1870-1954) of Superior, Wisconsin. He was a hotel manager and a creator of gadgets, many of which were patented. In 1905 Lavery was granted a patent for the "Lavery Phrenologist" but he could not muster financial support to perfect and produce the machines which he felt would revolutionize the field of vocational guidance. In 1928,

on a train, Lavery met Frank P. White, an entrepreneur from Minneapolis. The two men formed a partnership based on the mutual interest in phrenology. By late 1930 White held the exclusive license for the manufacture, sale and use of a new version of the "Lavery Phrenologist." Dr. Risse's 1976 *JHBS* article tells us more about these two men, their interests in phrenology, and the evolution of the psychograph from its intended use as a scientific tool to a diversion set up in department stores and hotel lobbies where passersby with spare change could print out a reading of the strengths and weaknesses of their character.

A maximum of 45 psychographs were manufactured. There are perhaps two or three intact, working machines still in existence. It is exciting that one is right here in Akron.

## Psychology Archives Accepted into Smithsonian Institution Affiliations Program

The Archives of the History of American Psychology has been accepted into the prestigious Smithsonian Institution Affiliations program. Smithsonian Affiliations offers museums across the country the opportunity to have greater access to Smithsonian collections and resources. The Psychology Archives is the first archives to be granted affiliate status.

Since the Smithsonian Affiliations program was established in 1997, the Smithsonian has established partnerships with more than more than 120 affiliates in 34 states, plus Panama, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia. Unlike traditional museum loan programs that place artifacts on loan for periods normally less than a year, the Smithsonian Affiliations program permits the long-term loan of artifacts. In addition, the program allows affiliates to incorporate Smithsonian collections in more than one format, allowing more of the Institution's estimated 142 million objects to be seen. "The Affiliations program is a very effective way for the Smithsonian Institution to reach beyond the geographical limits of its own museums," said Michael Carrigan, Director of Smithsonian Affiliations. As a Smithsonian affiliate the Archives of the History of American Psychology may integrate Smithsonian artifacts and collections into their exhibitions, educational initiatives, and research programs.

Smithsonian Secretary Lawrence M. Small has been a major proponent of the Affiliations program. "The circumstances are perfect for a win-win situation," said Secretary Small. "Museums around the country have an abundance of the one resource we're short of – display space. At the same time, because many of the museums are new and seek to expand and create new exhibits, they lack the very resource we have in abundance – objects."

In addition to borrowing objects from the Smithsonian's collections, the Psychology Archives will have the opportunity to utilize outreach services offered by the Smithsonian Institution.

## Information About The J. R. Kantor Research Fellowship Award

Fellows are expected to utilize the resources of the Archives of the History of American Psychology in support of a program of research and scholarship in the history of psychology. Preference will be given to applicants who have received the doctoral degree within the last five years. The award is intended to assist with travel and living expenses, up to \$1,000.00, while pursuing these primary sources. (If no award is considered to merit funding in any one year, the stipend could be added to the next offering.)

This Fellowship honors the memory of Jacob Robert Kantor (1888-1984) and his interest in the history of psychology. Over the course of a long and productive career at Indiana University, Professor Kantor sought to organize scientific values into a coherent framework by replacing mentalistic concepts with those derived from naturalistic observations. These priorities suggest that proposals might deal with the history of various versions of behaviorism, as well as with subjects such as instinct, intelligence, language, or memory; but proposals are welcome on any topic relating to the evolution of scientific psychology.

Applicants should provide five copies of the completed application form. Applications are available online at [www.uakron.edu/ahap](http://www.uakron.edu/ahap) or by contacting AHAP. The Committee will employ blind review. The deadline for receipt of proposals is April 30, 2003. Selection of the recipient will be announced by July 1, 2003. Funds must be used by June 30, 2004.

## Paul T. Mountjoy Graduate Research Grant

The Archives of the History of American Psychology is pleased to announce the availability of a new travel grant program. The Paul T. 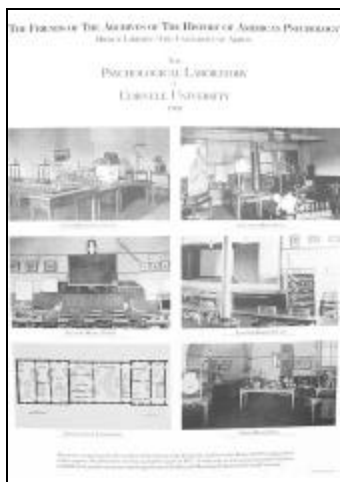

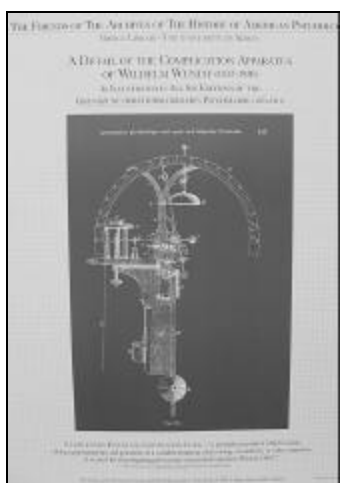

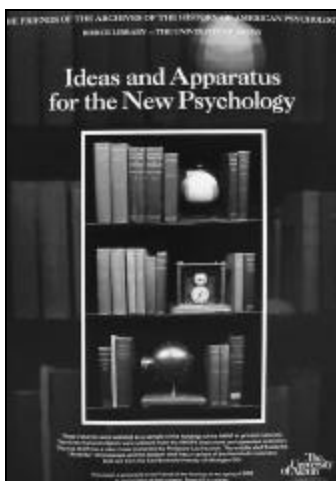
