Gabriel Ruiz earned his PhD in animal learning in 1987 from the University of Sevilla (Spain), where he is currently teaching History of Psychology and History of Neuroscience. His main research interest focuses on the influence of I. P. Pavlov on American Psychology and Psychiatry.



Natividad Sanchez received her Ph.D. in human learning and cognition in 1997 also from the University of Sevilla (Spain), where she is currently teaching History of Psychology and Comparative Psychology. Her main research interests include Adolf Meyer and his importance to American Psychology and the history of the beginnings of psychology related to laboratories and mental hospitals.

Professor Sanchez's talk is titled "*Adolf Meyer, Grosvenor Atterbury and the Henry Phipps Psychiatric Clinic: Putting back into the definition of hospital the full meaning of hospitality.*" Professor Ruiz will present "*William Horsley Gantt, and the Pavlovian study of the psychiatric patient at Phipps Clinic.*"
